

# UNAIDS and the Global Fund partner at the country to global levels to reduce HIV-related inequalities in 2022–2023\*

Since 2022, UNAIDS supported over 100 countries in attracting, implementing and leveraging US\$ 18 billion in Global Fund investments

## Joint advocacy for successful Global Fund replenishment

- 81 countries benefited from Global Fund investments for HIV or TB/HIV.
- Ensured timely and quality use of Global Fund investments while addressing implementation gaps.
- Promoted and guided increased domestic funding on HIV, including a dialogue with 12 African Ministers of Finance and the US President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR).

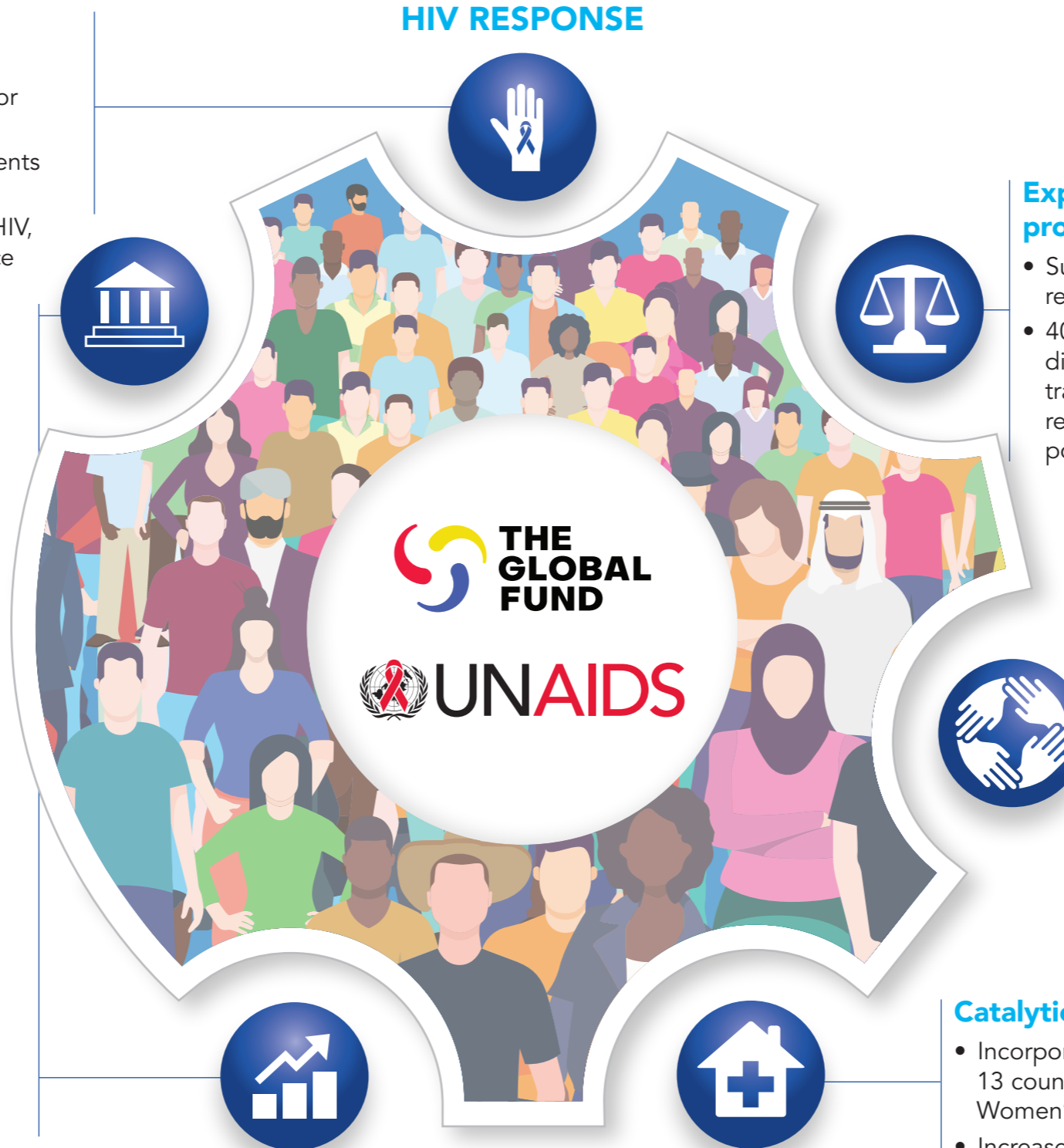
## Evidence-informed HIV investments for more sustainable responses

- 80 countries supported to ensure evidence-informed HIV investments across the grant cycle.
- 81 countries supported to review/update National Strategic Plans to optimize impact.
- Advanced, more resilient and sustainable health and community systems.

## Effective coordination, convening and country implementation

- Contributed to Country Coordination Mechanism in 75 countries.
- 57 countries helped with scaled up HIV services, including 1.68 million people living with HIV on treatment through UNDP–Global Fund partnership.
- Principal Recipient, i.e. managing HIV grants in over 15 countries.
- Logistics and supply chain expertise ensuring live-saving commodities (HIV, TB, non-food items, etc.) worth US\$168 million.

## Expertise and technical guidance for impactful programmes

- Successful submission of 47 Global Fund Cycle 7 funding requests for a total value of US\$5.9 billion.
- 400 Technical Support assignments helped improve differentiated HIV testing, prevention including vertical transmission, pre-exposure prophylaxis, community-led responses, gender equality, and reducing gaps for key populations.

## Champion human rights and community-led responses

- Increased community engagement, including from key populations in Global Fund decision-making.
- Prioritized funding for societal enablers informed by stigma index, gender and legal assessments, as well as community-led response.
- Knowledge sharing through communities of practice.

## Catalytic actions to reduce HIV-related inequalities

- Incorporated HIV prevention package in national strategies in 13 countries through the Adolescent Girls and Young Women's Strategic Initiative.
- Increased inclusion of refugees in Global Fund funding requests.
