Summary of the Joint Programme's support to the national HIV response in 2024

KEY RESULTS

- Over 137 000 key populations received HIV prevention services, with 86% accessing differentiated HIV testing.
- Pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) services were scaled up to 45 sites in 15 provinces, cumulatively reaching 31 000 individuals.
- 312 000 adolescents and young people were reached through a mobile app promoting youth health.
- Over 46 000 people living with HIV registered and received equity cards for free access to healthcare.
- The Sixth National Strategic Plan for a Comprehensive, Multi-Sectoral Response to **HIV/AIDS and Seventh National AIDS** Spending Assessment were launched.
