Peru also updated its technical regulations on HIV surveillance Peru finalized a US\$25 million Global Fund proposal to expand HIV among key populations and on the elimination of vertical and TB services, including PrEP scale-up, HIV treatment transmission of HIV, syphilis, hepatitis and Human T-lymphotropic decentralization, and care for advanced HIV in Condorcangui, with virus (WHO).

After sustained advocacy by UN agencies, civil society and academic 35 community-based organizations in Peru improved their capacity to partners, Peru's Congress approved legislation extending temporary mobilize resources, implement projects and obtain legal status health insurance coverage to non-resident foreigners living with HIV through a comprehensive online course completed by 57 community or tuberculosis. Support is now being provided to operationalize leaders, delivered in partnership with multiple UN agencies and civil society (UN Women, ILO, UNAIDS Secretariat, IOM).
